I am writing today to support the proposed Hollywood Center project. My wife and I have owned unit #704 in the Equitable Building at 6253 Hollywood Blvd for over 10 years now. Our unit, which we use as an office and sometimes residence for family and friends, faces north on the parcels where these buildings will be built, which we support.

We have also raised our children in the Hollywood neighborhood for over 20 years and in fact my wife's mother attended Hollywood High School. We embrace the Hollywood Center development as a continuation of the exciting and positive progress being made in Hollywood over the years, including the new subway line and more density with taller, beautiful buildings like Hollywood Center.

I've reviewed the Draft Environmental Impact Report. I am no expert on these matters, but I'm convinced that this project will address the needs of Los Angeles all while carefully minimizing impacts for those of us who live close the development.

The Hollywood neighborhood needs both market-rate housing and also rent-restricted affordable housing for our community. Los Angeles is a world-class city and more people will continue to want to call Los Angeles home. The best way to address the persistent housing shortage that afflicts not just the Los Angeles region, but the entire state of California is to build more housing.

This project does that, and most importantly it does that with inclusionary housing that will be set aside for very low-and extremely low-income seniors. And it will all be done in a neighborhood that offers walking to local stores and transit. This is a gamechanger.

Aslo, the commitments made by Hollywood Center to build green and build sustainability represent the goldstandard in green building and I'm glad that Governor Newsom is a supporter.

Last, the economic impact of this project will be very good for all of us: there's over \$1 billion in economic investment for Hollywood represents one of the largest private investments for the area. Thousands of prevailing wage jobs will be created, both during construction and once the project opens. Especially now, investment in our community is vital to creating jobs. And with unemployment increasing at historically high rates, these jobs are sorely needed.

I support the project in general but am particularly excited about the following features:

SITE IMPROVEMENT:

PEDESTRIAN ACTIVATION

At street level, Hollywood Center calls for 30,000 square feet of shops and restaurants, linked by a pedestrian paseo running east to west between Argyle Avenue and Vine Street. Combined with the revisioning of Hollywood Boulevard, the project's ample public space will create a walkable Hollywood, one that offers a pedestrian-friendly experience for locals and visitors alike.
