DRAFT ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT FOR LOS-ANGELES SPORT AND ENTERTAINMENT DISTRICT, LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA - SCH #2000091046

Dear Mr. Sholebo:

The Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) has received your draft Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the above mentioned Project. Based on the review of the document, DTSC comments are as follows:

- The draft EIR needs to identify and determine whether historic uses at the project site have resulted in any <u>release</u> of hazardous wastes/substances at the project area.
- The draft EIR should Identify the mechanism to initiate any required investigation and/or remediation for any site that may require remediation, and which government agency will provide appropriate regulatory oversight.
- 3) According to the previous environmental investigations in the draft EIR, there was no report regarding the investigations of asbestos containing materials, which might be released or dissipated into the atmosphere for any reason. In consideration of safety for the demolition and/or construction workers, there should be a clear and concise plan included in the draft EIR clarifying the sampling and/or analysis of asbestos prior to the demolition.
- 4) If during demolition or construction of the project, soil and/or groundwater contamination is suspected, demolition or construction in the area should stop and appropriate health and safety procedures should be implemented. If it is

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determined that contaminated soil and/or groundwater exists, the draft EIR should show a diagram of the concise plan that identifying how any required investigation and/or remediation will be conducted, and which government agency will provide appropriate regulatory oversight.
