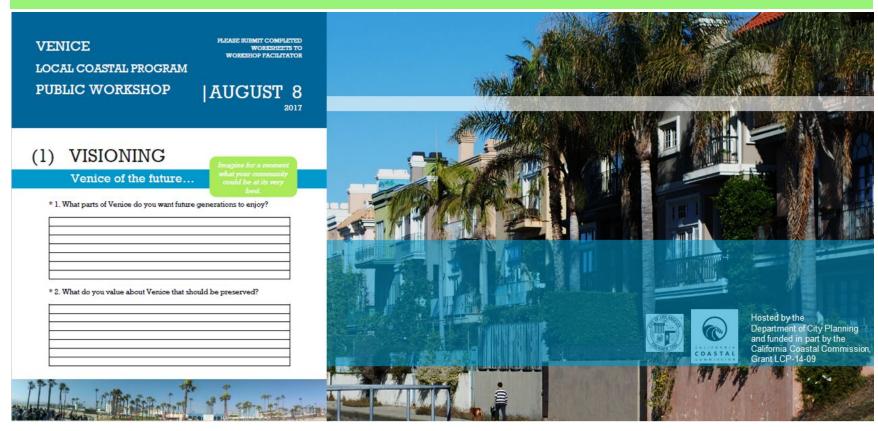

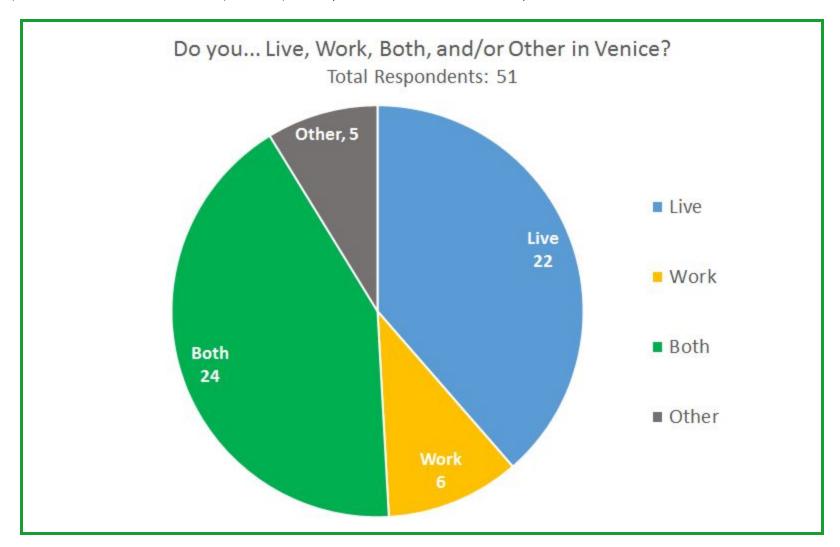

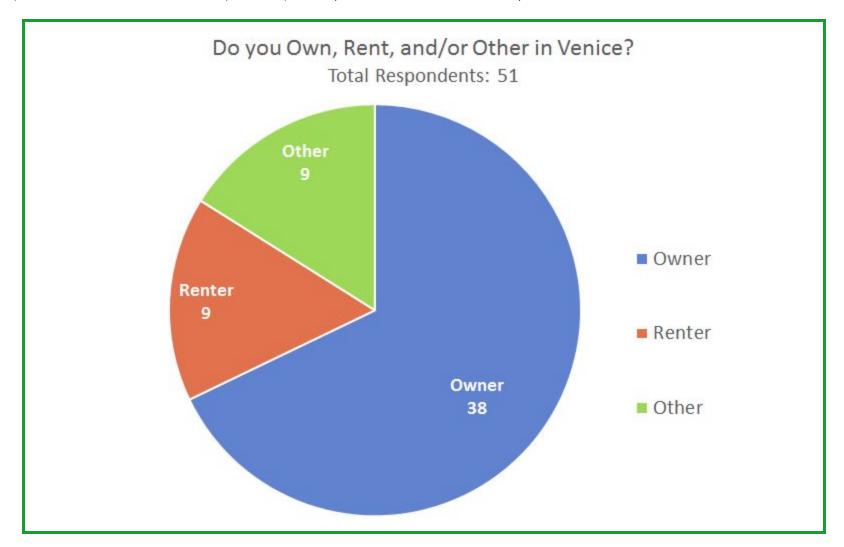
Part 1, #5: Do you Live, Work, Both and/or Other in Venice?

Respondents were able to choose up to 2 responses (Live/Work/Both and/or Other).



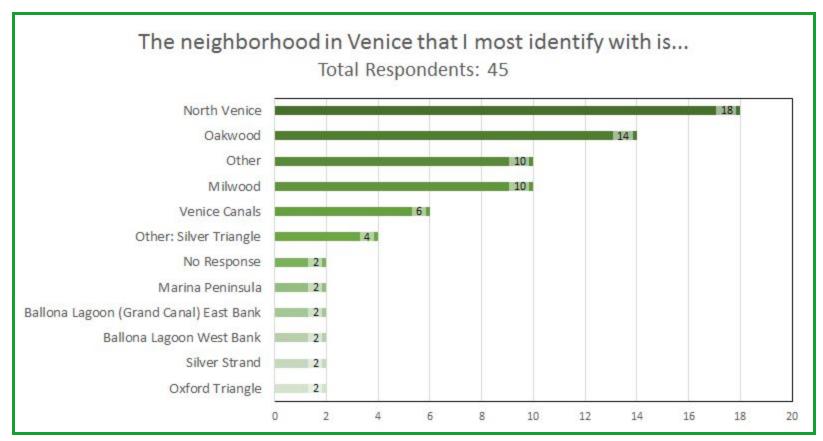
Part 1, #6: Do you Own, Rent, and/or Other in Venice?

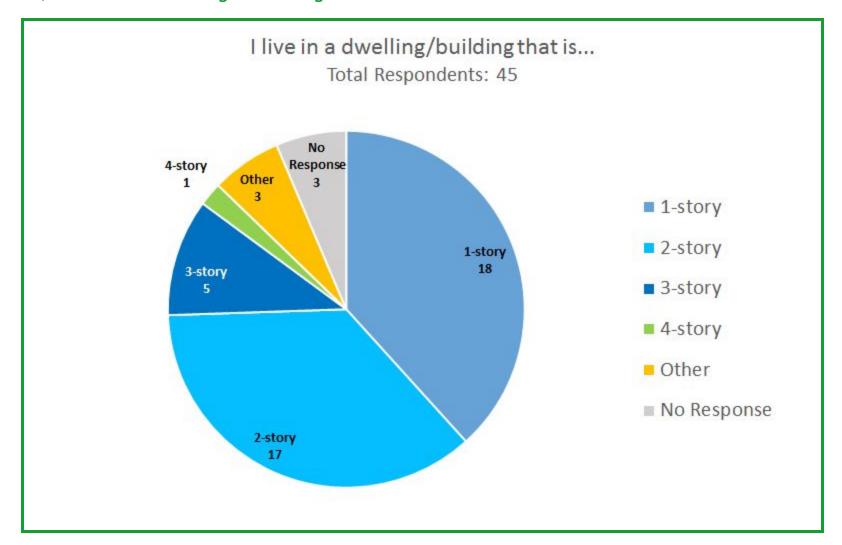

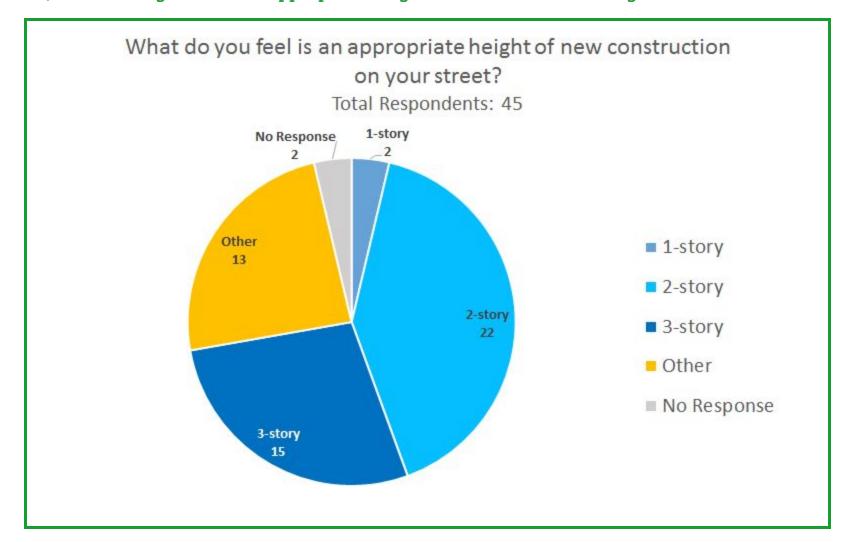
Part 2, #3: On your street, how important is consistency of the following form characteristics?

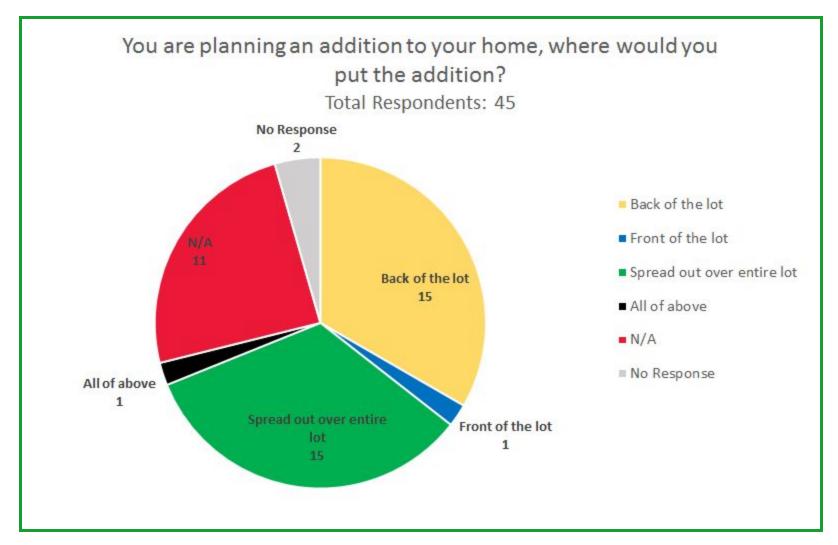
Part 2, #4: I live in a dwelling or building that is...



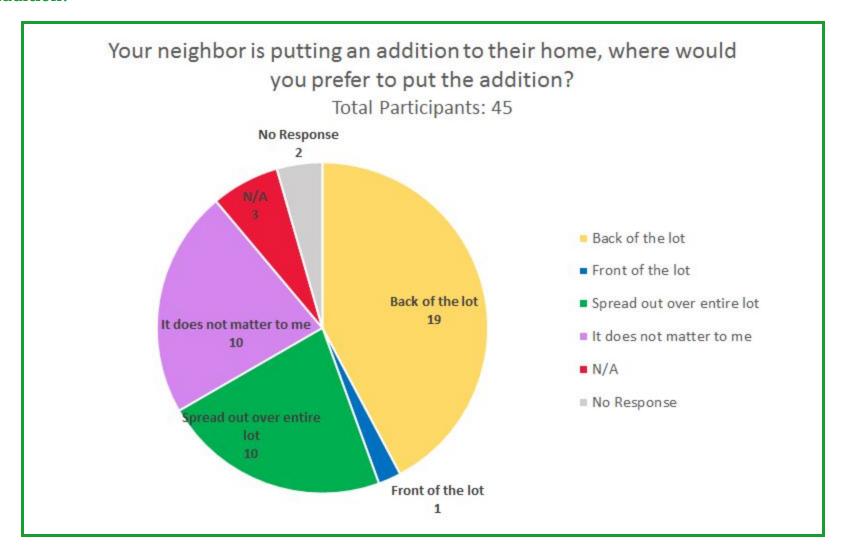
Part 2, #5: What do you feel is an appropriate height of new construction on your street?



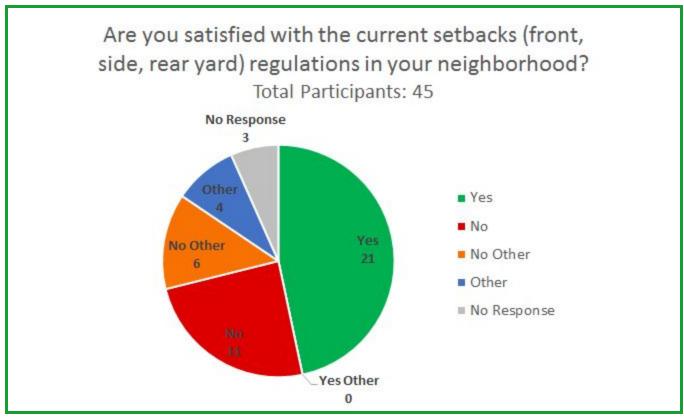
Part 2, #6: You are planning an addition to your home, where would you put the addition?
